Giant "M" on the Mountain Tradition Returns in Manitou Springs After Decades Hiatus

Manitou Springs, CO - A school tradition has now turned into a collaboration between alumni, school staff, Manitou Springs Fire Department, and historians to return the giant "M" on the mountain (located next to the water tower) after several decades of being on pause.

The "M" is for Manitou. It's about school and town pride. People working on the project hope that this will promote a sense of community and solidarity.

The tradition first started in the 1950's with Manitou Springs School District's pep club. The rocks were whitewashed then. Over the years other organizations took on the responsibility of hiking up the mountain to maintain the "M."

Statistics about returning the "M" this year:

- 16 people worked on the project
- 13 gallons of environmentally safe paint
- 6 weeks to complete
- 40 feet tall by 5 feet wide (each leg)

The school is celebrating its 150th year, and the "M" will be unveiled on Friday, September 30 during the homecoming parade from 1:30-2:30 pm.
